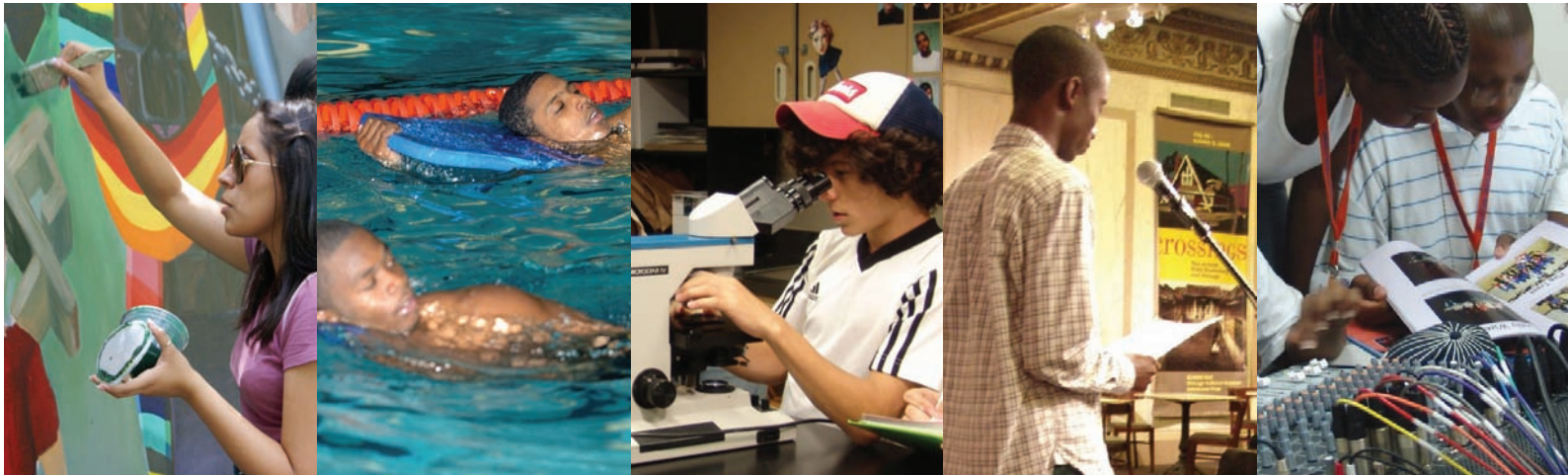




2010 ANNUAL REPORT



Letter from the Chair

Dear Friends:

During the 2010 fiscal year, thousands of Chicago teens in After School Matters programs explored and developed their talents in the arts, science, sports, technology and communications. As always, we are inspired by their accomplishments and they remind us why our work to provide quality out-of-school-time opportunities is so important.

Following are some After School Matters highlights from the past year:

- In September 2009, more than 2,200 supporters gathered in Chicago's historic Washington Park for our seventh annual gala, where nearly 200 teens dazzled the audience with their performance, visual and culinary arts skills.
- We kicked off 2010 with the launch of a unique partnership with longtime supporter United Airlines, who sold special snack boxes that featured the artwork of After School Matters apprentice Melissa Don. Domestic and international flights on which the snack boxes were sold also featured a video explaining the partnership and the importance of After School Matters.
- The creative spirit of our teens was showcased for hundreds of thousands of Chicagoans and tourists daily, as artwork by After School Matters apprentice Layla Ehsan adorned Bank of America's 8,600-square-foot "Chicago wall" mural adjacent to the Kennedy Expressway during the month of March.
- In June 2010, I had the privilege of addressing supporters, elected officials, media and others at a City Club of Chicago luncheon to share information about the importance and impact of After School Matters on Chicago teens, their families, schools and communities. After School Matters teens joined me that afternoon to display their talents and provide guests with a firsthand demonstration of why our programs are so special.

This is just a sample of the many wonderful highlights that After School Matters and our teens enjoyed in the past year. During our 2009-2010 program cycles, After School Matters offered more than 25,000 opportunities at 62 campus sites and more than 100 community organizations across the city. Each and every one of those opportunities was a chance for Chicago teens to explore their futures, develop their talents, gain critical job-readiness skills, and better prepare themselves to take the next step towards college and/or a career.

We are incredibly grateful to the instructors, staff, public partners and supporters who helped make all of this possible. As we continue to connect with and inspire new audiences, we know that more and more stakeholders will learn that After School *Matters*... it really does.

2009-2010 Highlights

White Sox National Anthem (August 2009)

A long-time supporter of After School Matters, the Chicago White Sox generously invited 37 teens from the After School Matters Vocal Arts Ensemble to sing the National Anthem at the August 23, 2009 White Sox vs. Baltimore Orioles game.

"It was bigger than we all thought," said Adira Hanna, a 16-year old student from Jones College Preparatory High School. "When you look up and see everyone, it was huge! It was a great feeling, we all felt so special. People came up to us after our performance saying how talented we all were."

And the recognition didn't stop there – the Chicago Tribune featured the event in five of their local publications throughout the city's south side.



Seventh-Annual Gala (September 2009)



The 2009 After School Matters annual fundraising gala hosted more than 2,200 supporters in three large tents in Chicago's Washington Park. Nearly 200 teens showcased their vocal, dance, instrumental and theater talents as well as culinary skills and artwork.

The gala program included musical performances by Jazz Big Band and Merit Jazz Workshop vocal performances by Project Theater and the Vocal Arts Ensemble and dance routines by the After School Matters Dance Ensemble, After School Matters dance group Hip Hop Culture and the Joffrey Ballet Intensive After School Matters program.

An onsite gallery featured teen artwork in various mediums, including metalwork, furniture, painting, photography and soft sculpture, which were available for purchase. Teens from the culinary arts program also assisted with the menu planning and serving of hors d'oeuvres during the event's cocktail hour.

The gala's presenting sponsor was AT&T. Other sponsors included Ardmore Associates; Bank of America; Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Illinois/Health Care Service Corporation; Case Construction Equipment; Charter One Bank; ComEd; CVS Caremark; East Lake Management & Development Corp.; Harris Bank; Loop Capital Markets, LLC; Ann Lurie; Neal & Leroy, LLC; United Airlines and Walgreens among many other generous companies and individuals, including Event Creative, who led the production of the event, and the Chicago Park District, a key partner of After School Matters, who hosted the gala in Washington Park. Thanks to the evening's sponsors and supporters, the 2009 gala raised approximately \$3.4 million, which went directly to helping After School Matters offer program opportunities.



2009-2010 Highlights (Continued)

Magic Johnson Master Class (November 2009)

In November 2009, teens in After School Matters Downtown region received a surprise visit from a sports legend when former Los Angeles Lakers basketball player Magic Johnson surprised them with an inspirational message about the value of hard work in achieving success and pursuing their dreams.

“Sometimes you have to get up off the video games to work on your craft, but trust me – if you put the time in, you could be awesome and great at the field that you choose,” said Johnson.

Chicago’s ABC affiliate, as well as community paper *Lawndale News*, published stories about this unique opportunity enjoyed by After School Matters teens.

Bank of America Mural Wall (December 2009 – March 2010)



During Fall 2009 Programs, longtime supporter Bank of America approached After School Matters to commission a piece of art to adorn the large façade of a building owned by the bank along the Kennedy Expressway in Chicago.

After School Matters Downtown programs engaged teens from various visual art programs to submit ideas either individually, or in teams. A selection committee was comprised of prominent members of Chicago’s art community, After School Matters, Bank of America and BBDO worldwide advertising agency. The group met in November to review submissions from 60 teens.

In December 2009, the commissioned piece was announced at a news conference at Gallery 37 Center for the Arts. Layla Ehsan, a 16-year-old resident of the Lincoln Square neighborhood, created a colorful, vibrant demonstration of the “Arts in Chicagoland” theme while showing the positive impact of arts and culture in Chicago. Layla’s piece was painted onto the Bank of America Mural Wall in March 2010.

In addition to the more than one dozen local media hits garnered from this story, Bank of America produced an impactful, comprehensive video following the mural process and featuring interviews from teens, Maggie Daley, President and Eloise W. Martin Director of The Art Institute of Chicago James Cuno and others.

The project wrapped up with a ceremony at the Art Institute, which featured a speaking program, slideshow of all submitted pieces and opportunity to view the finalists’ artwork on display in the museum’s Ryan Education Center.



2009-2010 Highlights (Continued)

NBC Nightly News – Making a Difference (January 2010)



Late in December 2009, After School Matters had the opportunity to work with *NBC Nightly News with Brian Williams* to create an organizational overview piece for their “Making a Difference” segment, which highlights organizations and individuals across America dedicated to improving their communities.

The two-minute segment aired January 4, 2010 and was comprised of interviews with teens, instructors and Maggie Daley, as well as action shots of sports³⁷ and other programs. It also touched on some key data about the importance of after-school programming and the impact of After School Matters. In addition to the main segment, NBC posted extended footage of their interview with Maggie Daley on their Web page.

Citywide Showcase (March 2010)

The 2010 Citywide Showcase featured a diverse range of cultural influences, including a traditional Flamenco dance from the apprentices at Kelly High School, vocal performances by the Curie High School Gospel Choir and the Chicago Opera Theater for Teens program, a Korean drumming demonstration by the Korean American Resource & Cultural Center and more.

Marisol Saucedo, then a senior at Kelly High School and teen participant in the Flamenco Arts program, spoke to the crowd of parents and other supporters, alongside Maggie Daley.



“Tonight is proof that Chicago teenagers like me can accomplish amazing things when given the proper mentors and learning experiences,” said Marisol. “After School Matters has made a tremendous difference in my life. Beyond learning the art of Flamenco dance, the skills and confidence I have gained from my program have better prepared me to take the next step in my education.”

The event’s presenting sponsor was again Blue Cross and Blue Shield of Illinois, a steadfast partner who has been sponsoring this event for five years.

An on-site gallery featured teen artwork in various mediums, including jewelry, textiles, painting, photography and soft sculpture – and guests indulged in hors d’oeuvres and desserts prepared and served by teens in the After School Matters culinary arts program.

The local media came out to support After School Matters, with FOX, NBC and ABC affiliates, and neighborhood paper *Lawndale News* featuring the showcase.



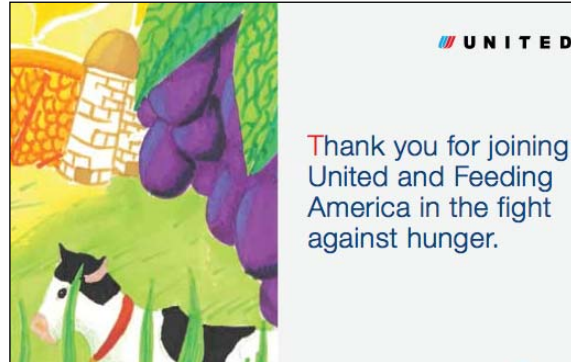

United Airlines Snackbox (March 2010)

In early 2010, After School Matters was invited to participate in a unique partnership with longtime supporter United Airlines.

An After School Matters teen design adorned a unique snack box that was sold aboard international flights, the proceeds of which benefitted Feeding America.

The box, as well as the in-flight video created by United Airlines and featuring an interview with Maggie Daley, gave After School Matters increased exposure to thousands of international passengers, and gave the teen artist, Melissa Don from the Westlawn neighborhood, the opportunity of a lifetime.

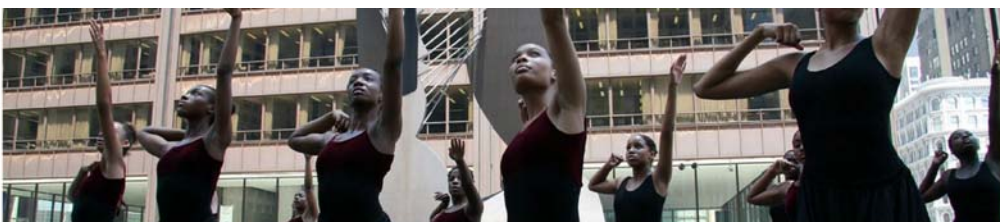


City Club of Chicago (June 2010)



In June 2010, After School Matters Founder and Chair Maggie Daley had the honor of speaking before supporters, elected officials, media and others at the City Club of Chicago. Maggie shared the history, achievements and importance of After School Matters – with help from a number of teens who were present to truly paint the picture for attendees:

- The science37 Foreman High School Lab (3235 N. Leclaire) demonstrated how chemical reactions can create silly putty, which they then distributed to guests.
- The tech37 Motorola Robotics program at Phoenix Military Academy (145 S. Campbell) demonstrated the robots they constructed for recent competitions.
- Teens from the Downtown gallery37 Painting on Canvas program displayed their artwork.
- words37 teen Jasmine Brown from Spoken Word Poetry at Kelly Hall YMCA (824 N. Hamlin) impressed her audience by reciting a poem by Maya Angelou.
- The Downtown gallery37 Vocal Arts Ensemble dazzled the dining room with an inspirational medley of songs.
- And the culinary program from the South Shore Cultural Center (7059 S. South Shore) distributed homemade cookies to over 350 guests at the close of the event.



The Impact of Our Work

After School Matters is enriching the lives of Chicago teens through the delivery of high-quality out-of-school time programming. As part of this ongoing commitment to excellence, we participate in independent research that evaluates the effectiveness of our programs and services. After School Matters programs have been evaluated by several top researchers and the findings have been used to continuously enhance and strengthen the organization's work.

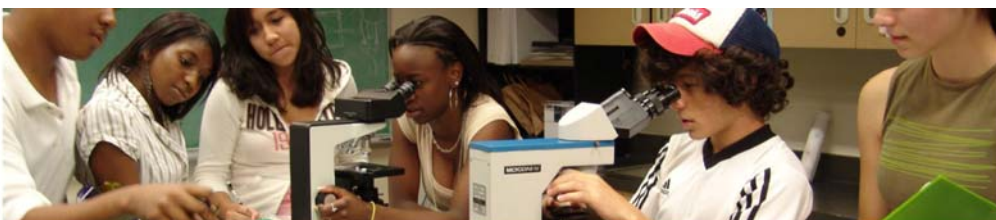
One example of this commitment is the research that University of Chicago conducted on After School Matters programs. Researchers followed a group of Chicago Public School high school students for four years and examined the impact of several semesters of participation in After School Matters apprentice programs. The findings concluded that:

- Students who participated in After School Matters had better school attendance than students who did not;
- Students who participated in After School Matters failed fewer courses than students who did not; and
- Students who participated in After School Matters graduated from high school at higher rates than other students.

After School Matters programs have also been evaluated by Dr. Robert Halpern, a nationally-recognized authority on youth development at the Erikson Institute. For two years, Dr. Halpern documented the activities of teens and instructors in After School Matters apprentice programs. The findings concluded that After School Matters programs:

- Produce positive effects in several areas such as improving teens' abilities to work in groups and to experience personal growth; and
- Teach students not only about the specific discipline that was the focus of their apprenticeship (e.g. arts, technology), but also about how to approach tasks related to the discipline, such as conducting research or envisioning the end product.

Additionally, investing in after-school programs provides much-needed jobs, and in this tough economy, we are pleased to be able to continue adding value. By providing opportunities to teens within their own communities, After School Matters is maximizing existing infrastructure and helping to revitalize neighborhoods.
